Dear Mr. Horwin:

The President has asked that the State Department reply to your letter of January 31, 1984, concerning Arab violence in the Middle East. Violence and terrorism are indeed a tragic and all too familiar aspect of that region today, although these evils are by no means limited to the Middle East.

The assassination of Malcolm Kerr and the other violent events to which you referred in your letter are particularly disturbing examples of this phenomenon.

With regard to the question of our support for Israel, I can assure you that the United States is committed to its security and to its qualitive superiority in military capability as a matter of policy.

We believe that, ultimately, the best guarantee of security for Israel and for a reduction of political violence in the region lies in the achievement of a just and lasting peace between Israel and its Arab neighbors. Of course, there are other causes and sources of tension and violence in the Middle East. But a resolution of the Arab-Israeli dispute would contribute greatly to a more stable and peaceful regional environment.

We believe the positions in the President's peace initiative of September 1, 1982 are fair and balanced and provide the only realistic basis for a just and lasting Arab-Israeli settlement.

Jordan, along with Israel, provides the key to a negotiated solution for the West Bank and Gaza. King Hussein has sought a path toward moderation and conciliation. However, Jordanian entry into the peace process has been inhibited by a number of factors, including the absence of necessary support from the moderate Arab states and sharp opposition from Arab rejectinists. With our encouragement, Hussein is continuing to seek the support he needs to begin negotiations with Israel.

Re: Assassination of Malcolm Kerr in Beirut

Dear Sir:

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The assassination of Malcolm Kerr in Beirut, by Shia Arab assassins claiming responsibility, and citing their reason as Professor Kerr's American origin, gives cause for rethinking.

But it is not the rethinking which the assassins would suggest.

This is but the latest outrage, reflecting the grave instability of the Arab World, for reasons which go way beyond any issues between Israel and Arabs.

Kerr was an international scholar, well known for his Arabist and pro-Arab opinions.

The assassins say they shot him to force America and France out of Lebanon. In the same country, very recently, at Tripoli, anti-Arafat PLO Arabs murdered pro-PLO Arabs and vice versa, as their way of settling issues focused by anti-Arafat President Assad of Syria.

Not long before, Christian Falange Arabs murdered PLO Muslim Arabs at two camps in Beirut, and some time before that, PLO Muslim Arabs had murdered thousands of Christian Falange Arabs at Damur and elsewhere -- as their mutual way of settling differences.

Between the two events, President Assad's Bathist Arabs of Syria murdered Muslim Brotherhood Syrian Arabs at Hama in the thousands, as his way of settling differences with the majority Sunni Arabs of his country.

Muslim Brotherhood Arabs of Egypt, not too long ago, murdered anti-religious fanatic President Sadat of Egypt as their way of final settlement.

Not so long ago, Shia Arabs of Saudi Arabia seized the holy center of Mecca, and were later executed by the Sunni Moslem government of Saudi Arabia, as their mutual ways of religious piety.

The United States has officially noted on occasion that President Kaddafi of Libya has made a regular practice of assassination, by Libyan Arab terrorists and others, and of threatening assassination of leaders, both in the Sudan and in Egypt, as his way of enforcing Libyan (Kaddafi) interests.

Some while back, but continuing to the present date, Arab President Hussein of Iraq made a surprise attack upon non-Arab Iran, unleashing a mutual holy war between Sunni Arabs of Iraq and Shia non-Arabs of Iran, which has cost enormous casualties on both sides, and threatens European and Japanese oil sources in the Persian Gulf.

I leave unmentioned the tragic Arab Shia policy by assassination, assisted by Syria, of the Bechir Gemayel President and Cabinet of Lebanon, of US personnel at the American Embassy at Beirut, of American Marines, French peace keeping forces, PLO assassinations of American Diplomats in the Sudan, etc., etc.

The point is that instability, violence and assassination is a way of life which has characterized the Arab World. These phenomena are not related to any single dispute, issue or country, nor are they the product of any single one. They are in the nature of the area, which is accustomed to the settlement of issues, and transfer of power, primarily by violence.

The Kerr assassination should give serious pause to those who would extend the area of this violence and instability, for example, by pressuring Israel to admit another Arab State, whether Hussein of Jordan, or PLO, or otherwise, to the West Bank of the Jordan, the Gaza Strip or, in the case of Syria, the Golan Heights -- instead of recognizing that Israel cannot abandon these areas to violence and instability without utmost threat to itself and the Free World.
