TO: ALL AIR TRAFFIC AND AIRWAY FACILITIES PERSONNEL

I know you are busy--and I commend you for your performance the past three or four weeks, but I believe it desirable to review some of the issues I know have been on your minds. The first issue is to clear the air on the persistent rumor that continues to surface, although most of you by now accept it for what it is. We are not talking to PATCO, or any other union, or any other individuals or interests concerning amnesty or any other subject. I advised the Secretary and the President to reflect our position that the strike is over, and we have directed all of our energy to rebuilding the system. them fully support this decision. We have no intention of changing from that position. Although there were some fine people lured into walking away from a rewarding career, unfortunately we have to consider that as a tragedy in our history and proceed with our tasks. I urge you to constantly keep actual events in your mind when you mentally consider the situation: (1) I sent out a taped message; (2) I sent notices for posting on bulletin boards; and (3) I sent a personal letter from me to the home address--so their families would know-of all 17,000 plus people. No one can say I didn't advise them in advance. That is now behind us.

A very serious issue right now is the harassment that many of you are experiencing as you go to and from work and at home. am not insensitive to that, and am working vigorously with the Justice Department to solve this very distasteful problem. We are constrained by, and limited to, what local laws will allow. Some of Ray Van Vuren's people have been out into the field where you are and experienced what some of you are putting up They are saying that you have to be there to know what is really happening. I can relate to that, and I am using every avenue available to me to relieve this situation, if not stop it. I have personally called some Congressmen and Senators and Mayors, etc., in some of your districts and made it very clear to them what could happen if we don't get relief from this abuse. In all candor, we at the Federal level have limited authority at the local level, and I cannot promise you complete relief. I can promise you we will keep trying!

For a more pleasant subject: As I said before, we are going to rebuild the system. When I say we, I mean just that. starters, Ray Van Vuren and his staff have started to build the framework of this new system. Soon he will have all of our center chiefs come to Washington to talk about our plans and how we will proceed. This is to be followed by a number of our terminal chiefs. They will then go back to their facilities and solicit your input and support. I want you to be innovative and imaginative because through you we are looking at making significant changes and improvements not only in the technical end of this business, but in the personnel relationships that are a must for a good organization to function. We will be asking some of you to come to the Development Center for short visits, and we will be sending our engineers out to visit you -- to get the benefit of your experience and ideas into the next generation of equipment.

The malignancy of hostility that has needlessly prevailed in recent years in our facilities cannot be allowed to surface again. Toward that end, I have formed a task force to examine the role of the air traffic controller by evaluating the operating practices and the process by which the FAA maintains the safety and the control of air traffic as it rebuilds the system. In announcing the plan, the Secretary said that the goal in ordering this study is to provide every possible support to the men and women working in the system. Equally, I am concerned about the job content, the supervisors' contributions, and the long-term employment stability of both.

On a separate issue, I have asked the Flight Safety Foundation, an independent organization, to take a look at our system as it relates to those allegations that it is unsafe. I am personally confident that you are maintaining our historical safety standards, but we must leave no doubt in our own and the public's mind. I have confidence the Flight Safety Foundation will be both objective and thorough. The NTSB has also decided to conduct a similar task, although they say they have no information that would lead them to believe that it is unsafe. You will probably see some of them as they visit your facilities gathering data. We welcome both of these efforts because we know as you do that your hard work and diligence have made it a safe system. Operational errors will always be with us as long as we humans have anything to do with it, but you will be interested to know that right now we are running at less than half the average that we normally have, that is compared to the same period last year.

Before I continue, I do want you to understand that while most of the issues getting attention deal with towers and centers, we are really talking about a team effort. I recognize that those of you in our flight service stations and airway facilities sectors, as well as our people in the regions, the Technical Center, the Academy, and here in Washington are also

an integral and indispensable part of this organization. Without your support, we could not function. I know it-the Secretary knows it.

I know that many of you are putting in long hours and through sheer dedication to your profession, you are making it work. I commend you. Also, I want you to know that your telephone calls, telegrams, and letters have been a great source of encouragement for me. I'm trying to answer them, but there are just too many. I do want to impress upon you though, don't push yourselves and try to take on too much. We've tried to throttle back the system through our ATC Command Center or Central Flow as many of you know it, but we must depend on you to throttle back yourselves. Don't get overly tired -- or take on too much! We would rather slow things down than risk losing some of our most valuable assets--those of you on the front lines. Many of you are riding a high, but soon you will emotionally start to come down. I know you are aware of this, but I just want to caution you that it will happen. I also want you to know that you can count on me and everyone else here to support you. I've been through this sort of thing numerous times, and can forecast the sequence of events. There are a number of things we are working on in an effort to provide you with relief in various areas. However, I am not going to discuss these issues until we have them pretty well lined The worst thing we could do is to promise you something and then not be able to deliver. I will be working closely with Congress on many of these issues. The superb job that all of you are doing now is making that task easier for me to accomplish. However, rest assured I am not unmindful of your efforts.

Within the next few weeks the Deputy Administrator, Mike Fenello, and I will be out visiting with some of you and will be able to personally express our gratitude. In closing, I want to leave a couple of thoughts with you. Winston Churchill said it all: "Never have so many owed so much to so few." Equally, the height of professional management is reflected in a simple statement: "Managers make things happen." While we should clearly acknowledge the former, more so we must recognize that the future rests with the latter.

I've no doubt we can do it. Our new system will be far better, far more productive, far more responsive to our people's true needs, and far more recognition that it is a good profession, well paid, with proper acknowledgment of the contribution to our society.

Let's put the past behind us--and both look to and work for the proper role we will play in the future.





SUBJECT:

Presentation of Young American Medals

The law is clear on its face that the medals should be "presented personally by the President". There are several alternatives that seem to comply with the intention of the law: (1) Have the President personally present the medals. (2) Have the President sign the certificates and write a letter to each recipient stating that he is making the presentation through the letter and send these letters through the mail with no ceremony. (3) Have the President write such letters presenting the medals and have the Vice President deliver these letters and the medals to the recipients at a ceremony. (4) Have the President write the same letter and have the Vice President actually physically present the medals and have the President drop in at the ceremony.

The important thing is that if the President does not personally hand the medal to the recipient that the letter state he is in fact presenting the medal to the recipient.

I spoke with Mary Lawton at Justice about this and you should be aware that there may be some Congressional flack if the President does not personally appear at the ceremony.

REMARKS OF THE PRESIDENT AT PRESENTATION OF YOUNG AMERICAN MEDAL FOR BRAVERY

The Rose Garden

11:34 A.M. EDT

THE PRESIDENT: Attorney General Smith, Bill Webster of the FBI, families and friends who are here with these young people and these young people who are going to be honored today, Senator, we're delighted to have you here.

They come to the White House as already citizen heroes to be honored by their government and their fellow citizens for their courage, their character, and their service.

The true test of civilization, it's been said, is not the census or the size of cities or the crops, but the kind of people the country turns out. And ours is a country that was born of heroes. And now in the first decade of our third century, tried by all the challenges those years could hold, our moral fiber is stronger still.

These nine young Americans are proof of that fiber and that strength. It's now my honor and my privilege to be able to present the Young American Medals for Bravery and Service to nine of our citizens who make all Americans very proud. (Applause.) And the Attorney General is going to present them to me.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: First, Mr. President, let me present Darryl Gregory and Wade Cornick of Virginia Beach, Virginia. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: You're Darryl? Wade? Turn around and let these people see you here. Let me tell you what's on the citation just briefly. These two young men here are, awarded the Medal of Bravery for their exceptional courage, presence of mind, and swiftness of action. On the fourth day of March 1975, regardless of their personal safety, they rescued Mrs. Isaiah Carr in actual imminent danger of losing her life in a fire, Virginia Beach, Virginia. (Applause.)

Darryl, I'm very proud to present that to you and congratulations -- and to you. Congratulations to you both and thank you. (Applause.)

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: Next, may I present David and Robert Christie, brothers from Eau Claire, Wisconsin. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: The citation there, in greater length than I'm reading here today determines that these two young men were given the Medal of Bravery for having exhibited exceptional courage, presence of mind and swiftness of action and again regardless of their own personal safety, on the fifth day of August, 1975, they rescued nine injured occupants from a burning vehicle near Thorp, Wisconsin. (Applause.)

Is this the one that exploded just after you got them out? There you are and congratulations. And I left one thing out I should have added. The measure of their heroism is that only a few seconds after they had completed the rescue, the vehicle exploded. (Applause.)

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: Next, the winner of the 1976 Young American Medal for Bravery is Donna Lee Slack of West Bloomfield, Michigan. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: Donna Lee Slack is awarded this medal for the same courage and the same swiftness of action and the same disregard for her own personal safety on the 20th day of March, 1976, in rescuing three small children when a tornado demolished their home in Bloomfield, Michigan. (Applause.)

Here's your medal and thank you and congratulations. (Applause.)

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: Next, I would like to present Tim Hoover of Hot Springs, Arkansas, winner of the 1978 Young American Medal for service. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: Just a minute here. Somehow I have lost a paper, but

MORE

anyway we know what it is for. And it is no less heroic. Young people who are willing to give of their time and their effort in public service to their fellow man, the young people and those who need our help on a voluntary basis. This is one of the things that we hope is going to — that we are going to see revived in America, more voluntarism, more effort expended by people in a neighbor—to neighbor way and less of the officialdom of government intervening in that field.

The medal that he is given is, as I say, for that kind of service that he has rendered. (Applause.) He is from Hot Springs, Arkansas. (Applause.)

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: Next, the 1978 Young American Medal for Bravery is to be conferred on Joel Peterson of Eau Claire, Wisconsin. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: Joel, welcome up here. This was December, 1978, three years ago. Joel, in great danger and risk to himself, laid down on the ice and pulled himself across the ice to rescue his friend who had fallen through the ice on the Eau Claire River and was in imminent danger of drowning, and certainly was disregarding his own personal safety in doing this.

Joel, congratulations. I am very proud to give you that.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: Mr. President, the winner of the 1979 Young American Medal for Bravery is Jerome Dale of Baltimore, Maryland. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: Jerome, congratulations. And here again is a young man who demonstrated that bravery, that disregard for his own welfare in rescuing two small children from a burning house in Baltimore, Maryland. (Applause.) Congratulations.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SMITH: And finally may I present the winner of the 1979 Young American Medal for Service, Carmen Maria Hernandez Rodriguez of Caguas, Puerto Rico. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: And here again, Carmen Marie Hernandez Rodriguez is recognized again for that equally heroic task, the long hours in devoting her full time in service to her fellow man. We are deeply grateful to you. Congratulations.

That concludes our ceremony today. I think that all of us should go away a little more inspired. There is nothing wrong with our country when we have young people doing things like that. Thank you. (Applause.)

I understand from Red Cavaney that there has been some question about our unauthorized involvement with the Justice Department and Congressional members regarding the White House event for the Young American Medals for Bravery and Freedom.

On August 5, 1981, Tricia Rodgers gave me the approved Presidential schedule for this event and a briefing book which the Justice Department had sent. She explained that Laurie DuMouchelle, from the Justice Department, would be contacting me regarding a press release. I talked to Laurie DuMouchelle and asked her to hold off on any press release until I could clear it through the White House Press Office. This was done via phone with David Prosperi.

Other than the press release, I have made no other authorization to the Justice Department. I did request the addresses of the youths who would be receiving the medals and explained that the White House would send out the notices.

I have no knowledge of invitations going to any Congressional member. In fact, I have not even received the addresses of the recipients and and have contacted no one or authorized that anyone be contacted.

Joe, I have discussed this with Ken Duberstein, Bill Gribbin, and Pam Turner of this staff and they all agree that the Congressional invitee list is a potential for disaster. Attached is the list of invitees, Governor and Senate/House wise. You might want to talk to Rich Williamson about the governors.

Of the House/Senate list, the inclusion of Paul Sarbanes, Dem-Maryland (already running scared for reelection), Don Riegle, Dem-Mich, Carl Levin, Dem-Mich, and William Proxmire, Dem-Wisc; plus Congressperson Barbara Mikulski, Dem-Balto, MD is nothing short of trouble. They are not the President's friends, are already criticizing him on AWACS and Social Security funding; most probably would talk to the press as they leave, etc. (Not to mention Mac Mathias, our liberal Republican)

I am enclosing a copy of the Attorney General's letter, dated August 21, 1981 in which he "look(s) forward to seeing you on September 11, 1981 at the White House." It is this office's understanding that only the White House invites to the White House. Also, Justice Department informs me that "if the White House is going to change 'policy' on the standard operating procedures on awards of this nature, we should have let them know some time ago. Neither Fred Fielding nor Elizabeth Dole's office knows of this 'policy.'

This office had no knowledge of Congressional participation until yesterday when Congressman Gunderson's office called to inquire as to when the Member would be receiving his formal invitation.

# Long Wait for Their Medals To End for 9 Young Heroes

negotiate with the Soviets on limiting nuclear weapons in Europe.

The long wait for nine winners of the Young American Medal for Bravery is finally to end Sept. 11 at the White House.

The youngsters selected over the past five years to receive the heroism awards are to be recognized then by President Reagan.

President Carter never found time to schedule the event, despite periodic pleas from the Justice Department officials who ran the program. Under the legislation that set up the program, the president must present the awards.

Ken Eichner and one of his Temsco helicopter pilots, Charles McLeod, rescued another person from certain death this week. The man's bost sank in stormy seas leaving him floating in a survival sait miles from any

Eichner dropped a life raft to the man and hovered while a nearby vessel tracked the helicopter on rader, and proceeded to the scene to pull the man from the water.

This is the latest in a long list of rescues guided and provided by Eichner, his company and by the members of the Ketchikan Volunteer Rescue Squad. We join those who have been rescued, who have been the subject of searches, and the people of this community in saying thanks, Ken.

Occasionally searches are more extensive. Ketchikan Volunteer Rescue Squad president Dick Borch has bad several hundred people involved in searches. The people in this community — the air taxi and aircraft owners, boat hunters. owners. state troopers, firemen, police. emergency medical technicians, Coast Guardsmen, Forest Service personnel, loggers - all have been quick to respond to a call for aid.

Borch recently retired as airport ferry skipper, He maintains his interest in the rescue squad. Bui his retirement reminds us that all of us have to slow down some. day. We'll regret to see that day for people like those who have guided the local rescue operation since 1947.

We hope there will be some who can fill those leadership position when the time

arrives.

## PROGRAM GOALS AND DISTINCTIVE FEATURES:

The Honeywell Prison Training Program in Computer Programming and Systems Analysis trains inmates in the Massachusetts State Prison System in the skills necessary to obtain jobs in the computer field. Program participants who reach an employable skill level before leaving prison have experienced a rate of recidivism (return to prison) of less than three percent, compared to an overall recidivism rate in Massachusetts of over 30 percent and a national rate estimated at 70 percent.

The program depends on the on-going commitment of Honeywell Information Systems and the voluntary efforts of Honeywell employees. Program participants who reach a certain skill level teach other prisoners taking more basic courses in the program and, at the same time, are required to continue taking advanced courses themselves. Since inmate instructors keep the program going, the program is self-perpetuating, and participants continue to learn at a state-of-the-art level as long as they remain in the program.

NUMBER OF PEOPLE TRAINED/ENROLLED: 450-500 trained to entry-level or above entry-level employability and placed in jobs in in a computer-related field upon release from prison.

Note: No accurate count of the number of individuals enrolled in the training program during its 14-year history is available. Program operators estimate that 2400 inmates have begun the programming training and failed to reach a level of competency which would qualify them for an entry-level job in the computer field (see Problems/Progress).

COST PER PERSON: Not applicable

FUNDING LEVEL OF PROGRAM: \$6500 - \$8500 per year at each of four institutions where the program is in place, for a total annual cost of \$26,000 - \$34,000 per year. (These figures represent an estimate of Honeywell's annual direct operating costs and do not reflect the value of computer hardware loaned by Honeywell for use in the program.)

Honeywell provides the part-time services of a salaried Honeywell employee to coordinate the training program, and also provides all necessary training manuals and other materials, including the computer hardware used in the program. Honeywell employees who serve as instructors volunteer their services and receive no reimbursement for instruction time or expenses incurred in conjunction with the program.

The Massachusetts Department of Corrections provides access to the prison facilities, classroom space, and, in some instances, has provided remodeling or renovation needed to house computer hardware.

Inmates in the program use approximately 50 percent of the income derived from commercial programming jobs to purchase supplies--including notebooks, pencils, coding forms and templates--and to underwrite specific facility improvements, such as air conditioning for the computer rooms.

DATES OF OPERATION: June 1967 - present

## PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Honeywell program began in June 1967 at the Massachusetts Background. Correctional Institution (MCI) at Walpole, in response to a request from a single inmate to a professional instructor at Honeywell for a course at the prison in computer programming. The inmate had read the help-wanted ads in a newspaper and felt that computer programming training might help him to find a job after his release from prison. The Honeywell instructor showed the request to his collegues, several of whom agreed to participate in a training program as volunteer instructors. Honeywell management backed the proposal, which offered high quality vocational training at low cost, and presented a preliminary program outline, including a proposal curriculum, to the department of corrections.

After securing department of corrections approval, Honeywell volunteers administered a standardized test to all interested inmates. The top ten scorers entered a fundamentals of electronic data processing course. The first session was taught by five Honeywell volunteers one night per week over a 10-week period. The Honeywell-designed curriculum did not differ substantially from the curriculum of courses taught by the firm outside the prisons.

A course in basic COBOL, a universal computer language, followed the fundamentals course. During the 17-week COBOL course, COBOL students taught fundamentals to a second group of inmates, thus setting the program's self-perpetuating mechanism in motion.

The MCI-Walpole program has grown over the years to include programs at MCI-Norfolk, a medium-security prison for men and the state's largest prison facility; the Southeast Correctional Center at Bridgewater, a medium-security facility for men; and MCI-Framingham, a medium-security coed facility.

from those assignments. Other senior inmates may be assigned to work in the programming operation as their primary prison work assignment. If that is the case, they receive two-and-a-half days of "good time"--time off their maximum sentences--per month as well as their prison wages (approximately \$1.50 to \$2.00 per day). Inmates working in conjunction with the program, or working in another prison work assignment, receive an additional two-and-a-half days "good time" per month.

Training. Participants generally require one year to eighteen months of course work to reach a standard of entry-level employability in programming/systems analysis. Three cycles of programming training are started each year.

Training is delivered in the morning or afternoon in two-hour classroom sessions, two or three times per week. Advanced classes are taught in the evenings on the same schedule. An effort is made to adapt the training to the schedules of prison inmates, who may have conflicting prison work assignments, or who may be transferred among various institutions during the course of training.

Fundamentals of Electronic Data Processing. Trainees entering the program begin their course work with fundamentals of electronic data processing, which introduces them to basic computer hardware configurations and various types of computer software. They acquire a grounding in computer terminology and examine various computer numbering systems, look at the various applications of the computer in society, and receive an introduction to basic computer logic. The fundamentals course consists only of classroom training.

<u>Basic Business Programing</u>. Inmates who pass the fundamentals course proceed to a course in basic business programming. In this course, students examine a given problem, break it down into logical components, put it into block diagram form, and develop a flow chart (the basic tool in preparing a computer program) for the problem.

<u>COBOL</u>. The final basic course is a course in Common Business Oriented Language (COBOL). COBOL is the most universal computer language, adaptable for use on most types of computer equipment. The basic COBOL course lasts from two to three months, during which students write and run numerous computer programs.

Final examinations. Final examinations in all courses are administered and graded by a Honeywell employee, a practice which alleviates some of the pressure on inmate instructors.

At the end of the fundamentals course, students must score 70 percent on a comprehensive final. If an inmate fails the final exam, he or she may take the course again starting at the beginning of the next cycle. The final examination in basic business programming—generally considered to be the most difficult course for newcomers to the computer field—is a practical exam administered and graded by a Honeywell employee and scored on a pass/fail basis. The final exam in the COBOL course involves writing and running a computer program.

Programming Experience. Students completing the COBOL course are considered to be employable entry-level programmers, though they still lack "live" programming

Design the program so that inmates must keep the ball rolling. From the very start, the Honeywell program has been self-perpetuating: inmates who learn a skill are required to pass that skill on to other inmates. A key element—inmate responsibility—has been present since the program's inception.

Leave selection and evaluation of program participants in the hands of the privatesector operator. Honeywell oversees trainee selection and evaluation and selects only inmates who are sincerely interested in obtaining computer skills; trainees are not simply warehoused in training sessions.

Design the training program to be comparable to training available outside the prison. Since the Honeywell training program is geared toward employability outside prison, the training is designed to compete with company-based training available on the outside.

Make sure that the private sector program operator maintains a neutral position in relation to both inmates and prison officials. The overriding concern in the Honeywell program is education and skills training, not prison reform and not enforcement of prison policy. Honeywell's neutral stance on prison issues unrelated to the training has helped the program operators to maintain positive relations with both inmates and prison officials.

Establish clearly presented program policies and enforce them consistently. Honeywell class attendance requirements are clearly stated and enforced. Senior inmates realize they must teach, attend class, and gain work experience if they wish to remain in the program.

Set one program goal—employability—and keep the program aimed toward it. Inmates in the program realize that they are being offered a chance to succeed outside the prison and know that when they leave the program, if they utilize the training to the fullest, they will have dramatically increased their chances of finding a job. This goal is reiterated throughout the program.

Emphasize the voluntary nature of instructor participation in the program. Inmates may assume that instructors from the outside are participating in the program to advance their own careers. When the program first began operating, the Honeywell program operators made sure that the inmates knew that participation on the part of Honeywell employees, with the exception of a part-time program coordinator, was entirely voluntary, and that the instructors did not receive a raise, promotion, or any sort of reimbursement for expenses incurred in conjunction with the program. The trainees respected this approach, and it set the tone for instructor/inmate interaction.

Avoid publicity, particularly during the early phases of the program. Widespread publicity for a company sponsoring a prison training program quickly begins to look like exploitation of the inmates. Honeywell prohibited publicity during the early years of the program and still maintains tight control over program publicity.

Learn to deal with the realities of the prison bureaucracy. A prison is its own bureaucracy, contained within a much larger bureaucracy. Frustration and delay come with the territory.

rate at which those trainees who leave prison prepared for entry-level employment ultimately return to prison. The rate of trainee recidivism is below three percent-dramatically lower than the Massachusetts rate (over 30 percent) and the overall rate for the United States (70 percent).

The response to the program from Honeywell, prison officials, and the inmates has been uniformly positive. The program has expanded over the years from one facility to four and enjoys continuing success. At any given time, the program involves about 10 percent of the population at institutions where training is in place. Commercial computer services offered by inmates have been quite successful, and inmate programming done for the corrections system and various other state agencies has saved the state of Massachusetts millions of dollars.

Problems encountered during the 14-year operation of the training program have been minimal. Many inmates are forced to leave training before they have reached an employable level: they are paroled; their sentence ends; or they are transferred to a half-way house or similar situation. These inmates are encouraged to continue their training, if at all possible.

## PROGRAM ADAPTATIONS IN OTHER LOCATION: None.

Note: There is great enthusiasm among Honeywell personnel for replication of the prison computer training program. However, efforts to replicate the program in other areas with a high concentration of Honeywell employees have, so far, been unsuccessful, largely because of the distance between volunteer instructors' homes and prison facilities.
