Congressman David Dreier from California called to my attention the following incident:

A gentleman named Richard Snyder (he's about 29, inherited the In & Out Burger chain and is currently the president of that corporation) contributed to the Reagan campaign and was told at the time by Mike Montgomery (California Republican Party chairman 1977-78) that he would get to meet Reagan as a result of the contribution.

He didn't meet Reagan and never even received a thank you for his contribution.

To bring this matter up-to-date, Mr. Snyder was invited to the Mostly Mozart reception here at the White House.

Congressman Dreier, however, would appreciate it if we would also send some type of note from the President to Mr. Snyder that might include a notation that this matter was mentioned by the Congressman (or however that could best be conveyed).

Mr. Snyder is a valuable constituent of Congressman Dreier and a strong supporter of the President and I feel both would be well served by complying with this request.
