It was indeed a pleasure and an honor for Pat Burch, Bob Kramer, and myself to have had the opportunity to meet with you and members of your staff to discuss America's adolescent drug abuse problem. It was particularly gratifying and reassuring for us to learn that your perception of the seriousness of the adolescent drug abuse problem is parallel to our own, and for us to learn first hand that this problem will be a priority issue with your office. We could not hope for a better ally.

We were even further encouraged by President Reagan's comments during his press conference of that same date, specifically, that one of the goals of his administration would be to emphasize the education of our citizens, particularly our children, to the hazards of drug use in an effort to begin that attitudinal change that will "remove the customers from the dealers". We fully agree with the President that the only ultimate solution is a change in attitude, and this is precisely the goal and objective of the National Federation of Parents. We are convinced that the best method of educating our young people is through their parents. We are further convinced that parents can and should be one of the most important factors in shaping a child's thoughts regarding drug use, but the parents of our Nation must be educated in order to effectively implement this prevention method. Unfortunately, the vast majority of America's parents are still unaware that drug use by their teenagers is more apt to occur than not, and most are still unaware of the serious health consequences to adolescents using such drugs as marijuana and alcohol.
