MAINTAIN THE NATIVE HAWAIIAN STUDY COMMISSION

WHEREAS, the culture, needs and concerns of the Native Hawaiians deserve an honest appraisal by a commission both in the interest of fairness and of harmony in the islands comprising our 50th State of the Union; and

Dear Mr. President:

The Mississippi Senate on April 3, 1981, adopted the enclosed Senate Resolution which concerns the allocation of Federal Funds to the States. Historically, the State of Mississippi has been allocated Federal Funds by federal agencies based on a weighted formula that takes into consideration the per capita earnings, the number of citizens below federal poverty level, the tax base, and other factors which have resulted in Mississippi receiving federal funds in a greater proportion than the total United States population.

The enclosed Senate Resolution supports President Reagan's reduction in federal spending and requests the Congress and the Office of the President not to make an across-the-board reduction in federal spending in the allocation of the Federal Funds to the States, but use a weighted formula for the federal expenditure cuts that takes into consideration those factors given above.

Mississippi presently receives annually approximately one billion dollars yearly in Federal Funds which are budgeted at the state level. This allocation is approximately fifty percent of the operating budget of the State and a straight across-the-board cut in the allocation of Federal Funds will have a disastrous financial effect on the State if the reduction is not made based on a weighted formula.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 11

A RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO ACT ON THE PRESIDENT'S ECONOMIC RECOMMENDATIONS IN A SUPPORTIVE AND TIMELY MANNER AND REQUESTING THAT THE FORMULAS FOR REDUCING FEDERALLY-SUPPORTED PROGRAMS BE PREDICATED ON THE RELATIVE NEED OF THE VARIOUS STATES OF THESE UNITED STATES.

WHEREAS, the American economic system is beset by an inflation rate currently exceeding ten percent per annum; and

WHEREAS, these inflationary pressures, if allowed to continue unchecked, will have catastrophic effects on the lives and futures of the citizens of our great country; and

WHEREAS, the uncontrolled growth of the federal government has resulted in deficit spending, waste and inefficiency of governmental operations; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has introduced economic measures and programs aimed at controlling the destructive forces attacking the American economy; and

WHEREAS, these measures involve significant reductions in the amount of federal funds available to the states for continuation of programs and services; and

WHEREAS, for fiscal year 1982 the State of Mississippi is expected to receive in excess of One Billion Dollars in federal funds, or approximately fifty percent of the cost of operating those services and programs provided by the state government; and

WHEREAS, a significant percentage of the federal funds received by the State of Mississippi is for agriculture programs and programs affecting the disadvantaged, the poor and the disabled; and

WHEREAS, federal funds allocated to the State of Mississippi are, in part, based upon a weighted formula that takes into consideration per capita income, tax revenue base, percentage of citizens below federal poverty level, need and other factors; and

WHEREAS, the President has recommended to the United States Congress an across-the-board reduction in federal expenditures of \$48.5 Billion which, if applied uniformly to all states, will have a most serious financial effect on the people of Mississippi and the delivery of vital services by the Mississippi government by a reduction of over \$300,000,000.00 in federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi has a very limited tax base and has the lowest per capita income of the states of the United States and the highest percentage of its population classed at or below poverty level; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that budget officers of the federal government not make an across-the-board percentage reduction in the allocation of federal funds to the states, but use a weighted formula for such cuts which takes into consideration the needs of the states and factors previously used by federal administrators in the allocation of federal funds to Mississippi and other states:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we hereby endorse and support the proposed economic plans, budget reductions and proposals for increasing the efficiency and economy of the federal government as presented by the President to the Congress of the United States.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we request that the Congress of the United States approve and expedite the implementation of the proposals presented by the President.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we request that the formula devised to implement the various federal spending reductions be developed using as a basis the relative need of the various states for federal funds support so as not to unduly burden those states which have the greatest need.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be furnished to the President of the United States and each member of the Mississippi Congressional Delegation.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION EXPRESSING THE SUPPORT OF THE LEGISLATURE FOR THE FAMILIES OF PRISONERS AND MISSING IN SOUTHEAST ASIA.

WHEREAS, more than seven years after the end of American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia there are approximately 2,500 Americans whose fate remains unknown; and

WHEREAS, recently released information from the United States Department of Defense indicates that prisoners and remains may yet be held in Southeast Asia; and

WHEREAS, there are continued reports from escaped Indochinese refugees which indicate Americans are among those held prisoner in Southeast Asia; and

WHEREAS, these brave Americans, who, bearing the flag of this country abroad, so proudly wore the uniform of this great land, must no longer be neglected; and

WHEREAS, the Socialist Republic of Vietnam, in violation of all basic humanitarian principles, deliberately continues to withhold information as to the fate of the aforementioned 2,500 missing Americans; and

WHEREAS, the anguish and suffering of POWs and MIAs and the unrelenting grief of their families are of no avail in securing an accurate accounting from Hanoi; and


WHEREAS, the fact of unaccounted for American Prisoners of War held against their will in Southeast Asia is a matter of grievous concern to all people of the United States of America:





Whereas, for more than 100 years, the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse has guided mariners safely around the "Graveyard of the Atlantic"; and

Whereas, the ethereal beauty of the lighthouse, noted by seamen and landlubbers alike, has made it a major tourist landmark for the Outer Banks of North Carolina, and for the State of North Carolina, drawing about 200,000 visitors a year from all over the world, it being 208 feet in height - the tallest lighthouse in the United States - and one of the few structures of its kind that the public can still ascend; and

Whereas, storm-driven ocean tides and resulting erosion present an imminent threat to the survival of this lighthouse which has, for so long, protected mariners from the treacherous shoals and rough seas; and

Whereas, when the State of North Carolina transferred the lighthouse property to the National Park Service in 1958, the federal government made a commitment to maintain and manage the property wisely; and

Whereas, the Governor of North Carolina feels that the commitment to wise maintenance and management of the property

requires that action be taken immediately to preserve this invaluable historic landmark;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

Section 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina joins Governor James B. Hunt, Jr., in recognizing the historical and aesthetic significance of the Historic Cape Hatteras Lighthouse for the reasons set forth above and in urging the National Park Service to immediately undertake action that will offer the most protection towards saving the lighthouse.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING UNITED STATES PRESIDENT RONALD W. REAGAN TO SUPPORT THE CONTINUATION OF THE CURRENT TENNESSEE VALLEY AUTHORITY NUCLEAR PLANT CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM, AND IN PARTICULAR, THE YELLOW CREEK NUCLEAR PLANT IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI.

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Valley Authority is in the process of constructing a nuclear energy plant in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in conjunction with that authority's nuclear construction program; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the suggestion that the completion of certain unit reactor systems be deferred, the Tennessee Valley Authority has deferred the completion of a nuclear plant unit located at Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant to a later date; and

WHEREAS, the deferral of any additional nuclear plant units at this time would not produce any appreciable reductions in legitimate anticipated electric rate increases over the next few years, and the cost of obtaining that postponed capacity later would eventually be higher due to the effects of inflation; and

WHEREAS, at the present time, the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant project is approaching eighteen percent (18%) completion, including the completion of most of the construction plant facilities, major portions of the grading and excavation required on the site, and foundation and structural work on the permanent plant buildings; and

WHEREAS, the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant project is currently employing approximately three thousand three hundred (3,300) workers, fifty-six percent (56%) of which are Mississippi residents, with employment expected to peak late this year at four thousand (4,000); and

WHEREAS, the monthly payroll expended for the employees at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant project approaches Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000.00) each month, upon which amount the State of Mississippi collects income taxes; and

WHEREAS, the total investment to date in the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant construction is over Six Hundred Million Dollars (\$600,000,000.00); and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Valley Authority nuclear construction program furthers the economic growth and industrial development so essential to Mississippi's future progress; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Mississippi, the Honorable William F. Winter, opposes any attempts to decrease the current level of construction efforts at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant; and

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Legislature has considered the impact on the state's economy of the further deferment of any additional nuclear plant units now under construction by the Tennessee Valley Authority, and urges that the

President of the United States, Ronald W. Reagan, support the continuation of the current Tennessee Valley Authority nuclear plant construction program and in particular, the construction underway at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant project in Tishomingo County, Mississippi:



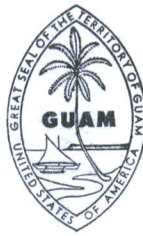

HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE REINSTATEMENT OF FUNDING FOR THE SEA GRANT COLLEGE PROGRAM AND THE OCEAN THERMAL ENERGY CONVERSION PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, the citizens of the State of Hawaii are concerned about the recent reports from Washington that federal funds for certain energy and marine programs are being completely abolished or severely curtailed; and

WHEREAS, according to the information from Energy Secretary James B. Edwards, all funds earmarked for ocean thermal energy conversion (OTEC) projects are being deleted from the federal budget starting in October 1981; and

WHEREAS, in addition, it has been reported that the Office of Management and Budget has recommended ending the Sea Grant College Program in the next fiscal year's budget; and

WHEREAS, substantial or complete funding cuts for these programs would adversely impact Hawaii and would severely set back the State's energy efforts as well as marine resources development programs; and

WHEREAS, the Sea Grant College Program is an integral part of ocean resources development in Hawaii providing seed money funding for various marine projects including, among others, manganese nodule mining, aquaculture, and OTEC-related research projects; and

WHEREAS, in addition, the Department of Energy funding has been instrumental in supporting the highly successful OTEC projects in Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget cuts of these funding sources do not recognize the importance of these programs to Hawaii, the nation, and the world as well; and

WHEREAS, for example, the development of a viable manganese nodule industry in the United States is in the national interest for national security purposes due to the fact that the manganese nodules are rich in the manganese,

nickel, copper, cobalt, and other metals critical for our industrial needs; and

WHEREAS, except for copper, the United States is almost completely dependent upon foreign sources of supply for these essential metals; and

WHEREAS, several international consortia are considering Hawaii as the location of their manganese nodule processing plants; and

WHEREAS, in order to reduce our nation's dependence on imported oil and to meet our nation's future energy needs, alternative energy resources must be developed; and

WHEREAS, OTEC, which relies on temperature differentials between warm surface water and colder bottom water to generate electricity, offers a means of meeting a substantial portion of our nation's future energy needs utilizing a renewable energy resource which is essentially inexhaustible; and

WHEREAS, because of Hawaii's favorable climatic, marine, and geographic features, all three of the nation's major OTEC projects, the mini-OTEC, the OTEC-1, and the Seacoast Test Facility are located in Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet the protein needs of underdeveloped countries as well as our own needs, more efficient means to produce food, particularly protein, must be developed; and

WHEREAS, aquaculture and mariculture provides an excellent means of meeting these needs; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii is currently the recognized leader in the aquaculture of prawns and the first state in the nation to develop a comprehensive master plan for aquaculture development; and

WHEREAS, while these aforementioned programs provide major economic opportunities for Hawaii, these programs also have major national as well as worldwide benefits and significance; and

WHEREAS, the State's long-term plan for each of these programs relies on participation and further funding from the

Sea Grant College Program and the Department of Energy; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Eleventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1981, that the President of the United States is respectfully requested to reconsider the decision to delete funds in the federal budget for the Sea Grant College Program and the OTEC program and to reinstate such funds; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the Secretary of Energy, the Secretary of Commerce, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of Hawaii's Delegation to the United States Congress.

WHEREAS, many of the social and economic problems facing Hawaii can be traced to the stress that increasing population places on our limited natural resources; and

WHEREAS, included among these problems are the availability of affordable housing, the cost of social services, unemployment, crime, and other social problems emanating from competition for finite resources; and

WHEREAS, three major factors--natural increase, foreign immigration, and domestic in-migration--contribute to Hawaii's growing population; and

WHEREAS, among these major factors, foreign immigration has shown the most dramatic increase since the United States Congress revised immigration policy in 1965; and

WHEREAS, while during the period 1960-1969, approximately 36,000 aliens arrived in Hawaii stating an intention to reside in the State, the immigration rate nearly doubled in the period 1970-1979, with 71,900 arriving immigrants; and

WHEREAS, since 1970 Hawaii has received a greater influx of immigrants per 100,000 population than any other state in the Union; and

WHEREAS, there is every reason to believe that Hawaii will continue to be the preferred state of settlement for a disproportionately large number of immigrants; and

WHEREAS, although foreign immigrants generally have a strong will and purpose in working hard to improve themselves, many immigrants require social assistance in adjusting to new lives and becoming contributing members of the community; and

WHEREAS, because such assistance must be provided by the State of Hawaii with little or no support from the federal

government, services to local residents are affected; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Eleventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1981, that the members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, and the Majority Leader of the United States House of Representatives are requested to sponsor, and work toward the passage of legislation providing financial assistance to states such as Hawaii which receive large numbers of foreign immigrants, with funding especially directed toward alleviating the social, economic, and employment hardships of immigrants; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, the Majority Leader of the United States House of Representatives, and the Hawaii House Committee on Public Assistance and Human Services.



WHEREAS, on March 30, 1981, the entire nation was rendered helpless in disbelief as it anxiously awaited word that our president was unharmed; and

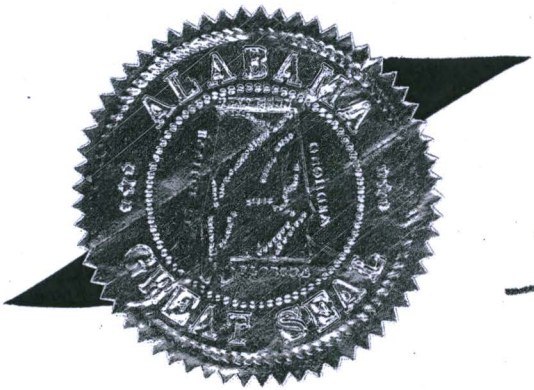



Whereas, As the President waved to more than one hundred onlookers, a lone gunman broke through the crowd and opened fire — wounding the President and critically injuring three other men, including the President's close aide, Press Secretary James S. Brady, and two law enforcement officials, Secret Service Agent Timothy J. McCarthy and District of Columbia Police Officer Thomas Delahanty; and

Whereas, The assassination attempt touched off an air of national crisis, and shocked our entire nation with the all-too familiar scene of senseless acts of violence upon public servants; and

Whereas, Ronald Reagan is the eighth President of the United States to have been attacked by a gun-wielding assailant; and

Whereas, The incident became a grim reminder of the deep sadness felt by our own generation by the assassinations of President John F. Kennedy, his brother Robert F. Kennedy, and civil rights leader Martin Luther King, Jr.; and

Whereas, It is unconscionable that in our free society, where liberty under law is a most cherished virtue, the leaders of our nation must endanger their lives to serve their country; and

Whereas, It is the sense of this Legislative Body that our nation will remain strong in these troubled times, and will unite with a determination to end the assaults upon the honored traditions and institutions that make this country the greatest democracy in the world; now, therefore, be it
