Thank you for your recent letter to President Reagan forwarding many petitions urging Congress to provide Amtrak with more funds.

The Administration has proposed a reduction in Federal subsidies to Amtrak as part of the President's program to cut Federal spending and reduce inflation. Amtrak services a relatively small number of travelers. Common-carrier air and bus services, which receive much lower Federal subsidies, are available in most of the cities served by Amtrak. Large Federal subsidies to Amtrak, almost one billion dollars in 1981, cannot be justified under these circumstances.

In general, intercity auto travel is more fuel-efficient than Amtrak whenever three persons travel in the auto. Service in high-density "corridors" routes, where the fuel-efficiency of Amtrak service is the highest, achieves 75 passenger-miles per gallon on the average, just slightly more than one-half of the fuel-efficiency of intercity bus, which is 135 passenger-miles per gallon.

Amtrak receives substantially more in public subsidy than either the airlines or the bus companies. This is true whether the comparison is based on total funds received, total funds per passenger or total funds per passenger-mile. Commercial airlines pay user fees to cover airport costs. Bus companies pay for the operation and maintenance of their bus stations and receive a relatively small subsidy by not paying fully for their proportionate use of highways. Accordingly, air and bus activities are carried on with minimal public funds for operation and maintenance.

The Administration has proposed that in 1982 Amtrak cover 50 percent of its costs by fares or subsidies other than from the Federal Government.



We believe that, with the Administration's proposed amendments to the Rail Passenger Service Act, Amtrak will have adequate funds for services beyond the Northeast Corridor. Amtrak will have to raise fares, cut expenses and eliminate its least-patronized and most unprofitable routes to accomplish this objective, but it can be done. These proposals and the subsidy reductions are important components in the Administration's effort to meet the nation's economic challenges.

I appreciate your taking the time to share your concerns with us.

WHEREAS, over 49,000 Americans die every year in motor vehicle accidents, according to the National Safety Council statistics, and

WHEREAS, many of these fatalities are alcohol-related, and

WHEREAS, over the past five years (1975-1979) the eighteen to twenty (18-20) year old drivers have been involved in the yearly average of 20,901 injury producing motor vehicle crashes in the State of New Jersey, representing 14% of the total yearly average of all injury crashes experienced in our state, and

WHEREAS, over the past five years (1975-1979) the eighteen to twenty (18-20) year old driver has been involved in the yearly average of 222 fatal motor vehicle crashes in the State of New Jersey, representing 15% of the total average on a yearly basis of all fatal crashes experienced in our state, and

WHEREAS, during the past five years (1975-1979), the eighteen to twenty (18-20) year old driver has been involved in the yearly average of 33,948 property damage crashes, representing 14% of the total yearly average of all property damage crashes experienced in our state, and

WHEREAS, a yearly average of 1,445 drivers (all age groups) who were involved in the fatal crashes over the past years (1975-1979) in the State of New Jersey, of which 47% or 679 were alcoholic-related fatal crashes, 17% or 120 drivers were in the eighteen to twenty (18-20) age group, and

WHEREAS, the above statistics provided by the Office of Highway Safety for the State of New Jersey, reveals that the eighteen to twenty (18-20) year old drivers for the years (1975-1979) which represents only 7.6% of the total licensed drivers in the State, also represents 14% of all property damage crashes, 14% of all injury crashes and 15% of all fatal crashes experienced in the State of New Jersey, and

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey, Department of Health (Division of Alcoholism), estimates that four percent (4%) of those treated at Alcoholism Services in New Jersey in 1979 were in the eighteen to twenty (18-20) year old age group (943), with this figure being consistent for the years 1977-1979, inclusive, and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Uniform Crime Report for the years 1977, 1978, and 1979 reveals the following statistics:

WHEREAS, the New Jersey State Juvenile Aid Officers Association, Inc., in conjunction with the New Jersey Police Traffic Officers Association, the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers, the New Jersey Association of Chiefs of Police, the New Jersey Education Association, the New Jersey State Policemen's Benevolent Association, the New Jersey Narcotic Enforement Officers Association, the National Council of Alcoholism (North New Jersey Division), the New Jersey State Directors of Athletics Association, and the New Jersey Fraternal Order of Police, has proposed that an amendment to the Constitution of the United States be introduced in the legislatures of each of the fifty United States. The New Jersey School Boards Association supports immediate restoration of the twenty-one (21) year old drinking age in New Jersey, but has not advocated a change in the Federal Constitution.

RESOLUTION URGING PRESIDENT RONALD REAGAN TO HONOR THE COMMITMENT TO CONSTRUCT THE SOUTH JERSEY VETERAN'S HOSPITAL

WHEREAS, the Township Committee of the Township of East
Greenwich has duly noted the stated promises of President Reagan
prior to his election to maintain this Country's commitment to
its Veterans, especially those who serve with such honor and distinction in the Vietnam War, large numbers of whom are in need

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, The accidents, hazards, and deaths arising from cigarette fires are needlessly and tragically high; and

WHEREAS, In 1978 alone there were some 70,000 smoking related fires in this country which resulted in 1,800 deaths -- an average of five deaths per day -- and 4,000 injuries; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated by the National Fire Protection Association that the dollar loss in the U.S.A. due to fire caused by dropped cigarettes reaches $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 billion dollars annually; and

WHEREAS, Experiments have demonstrated that a freshly lit cigarette will burn for an average of 24 minutes when placed on a flat surface, and it has been shown that a dropped cigarette must burn for five minutes or more before starting a fire; and

WHEREAS, The tobacco industry manufactures a majority of cigarettes by including chemical additives which promote their continuous or self-burning characteristics: and

WHEREAS, It is becoming abundantly clear that responsible steps must be taken to alleviate the unnecessary danger to human life by requiring the manufacture of cigarettes which if unattended will extinguish within five minutes; and

WHEREAS, There are over 20 patents which detail various methods for making cigarettes self-extinguishing; and

WHEREAS, House Resolution 6675, "THE CIGARETTE SAFETY ACT"; is now pending in the U.S. Congress and if enacted, would establish new safety standards for cigarette manufacture; be it

RESOLVED, That as the MAYOR OF THE CITY OF DANBURY, I hereby request that the United States Congress enact H.R. 6675; "The Cigarette Safety Act" in order to make cigarettes safer, and to reduce the senseless loss of life and property that too often accompanies the use of this product; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be submitted to the President and Vice-President of the United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to each Senator and J.S. Representative from Connecticut.
