Kosair and Children's Consolidation Becomes Effective May 1

On May 1 the consolidation of Kosair Hospital and Norton-Children's will become legally effective. Some of the immediate ramifications are:

- relief of Children's overcrowded situation,
- 24-hour pediatric coverage at Kosair,
- a redistribution of programs and services at both locations to better utilize each facility,
- administratively and organizationally, Kosair will become part of NKC, Inc., which will manage the operation of two hospitals—Kosair-Children's and Norton.

With the consolidation, planners have brought together two fine children's hospitals—a renowned, but aging, orthopedic facility and an overcrowded pediatric hospital—to create what will become one of the largest and best pediatric centers in the nation.

Both Children's and Kosair Hospitals have established traditions of quality care for youngsters. It is important to the NKC board that those reputations be maintained and that friends of the two hospitals recognize the continued and growing need for support.

According to Jack Wilson, President of Kosair Charities, studies conducted at Kosair and other specialty hospitals have shown a steady decrease in the use of hospitals that are isolated from large medical centers. Thanks to advances in medical care, the days of long-term hospital care are practically over for orthopedic pediatric patients. Children are treated and are able to return to their homes and schools much faster than in the earlier years of Kosair's operation. Because of that, the occupancy rate has dropped every year. Statistics at Kosair have shown a steady decrease in occupancy since 1957. However, there has been an increased demand for the specialty services offered there and the total number of patients treated has not declined. So the need for Kosair's expertise is still essential for "our children".


NKC President Wade Mountz stated that the consolidation of Children's and Kosair Hospitals will not mean major changes in the operation of either facility in the immediate future.

"The Corporation's Board of Directors will increase in number from 40 to 60 members, to include 20 Kosair directors, but Kosair Crippled Children Hospital will continue to operate in its present Eastern Parkway facility until construction of a new pediatric hospital is completed, probably by late 1984," said Mountz.

The long-term results of the consolidation will mean expanded health care services for the children of Kentucky and southern Indiana.

Jack Proctor, Executive Director of Fund Raising for Kosair Charities, said, "In light of the continued need for care of indigent children, rising medical costs for all patients, cuts in government funding, and the broader base of services that will be offered for sick children, funds will be needed more than ever. There will always be a Kosair and Kosair Charities to direct money to the care of children."

Wilson added, "In addition to our service in the field of hospital care, Kosair Charities Committee, Inc., will function as it always has and will continue to provide support for other programs for children. At present, for example, Kosair Charities is the largest single, local contributor to the Jefferson County Child Abuse Program. We provide space for the Department of Human Resources outpatient clinics, and we support the Kosair Scoliosis and Spine Treatment Center, the Kosair Professorship of Orthopedic Surgery at the University of Louisville, medical and surgical research, the Shrine Referral Program, and many other activities.'





The Hospital — An International Center

Foreign accents and interpreters are commonplace at Kosair these days. In recent months children from Greece, Nicaragua, Egypt, Vietnam, the Virgin Islands, Laos, and Ireland have been cared for and made to feel at home by the special warmth of the Kosair staff. Douglas Stump, of St. Thomas, in the Virgin Islands, was fitted at Kosair for a below-the-knee prosthesis after a motorcycle accident.

Seven-year-old Rolla Gad (top center) came to Kosair from her home in Dubai, United Arab Emigrates, for an evaluation of her physical development and a treatment program. Physical therapists like Mary Kay O'Connor find that smiles and encouragement overcome all language barriers.

At Christmas time, Alicia Cruz (top left), Kosair's little patient from Nicaragua, had an important visitor - her mother. Employees at the American Embassy in Managua, concerned because the mother and child had been separated since May 3, coordinated the arrangements for Mrs. Cruz' trip and donated their own money to pay for the flight from Miami. The Nicaraguan government provided her transportation to and from Miami. Mrs. Cruz stayed with a Louisville family before returning to her husband and five other children.

Looking Well into the Future National Hospital Week May 10-16, 1981

"Looking Well into the Future" will be the theme of the American Hospital Association's celebration of National Hospital Week, May 10-16.

Edward Schottland, President of Kosair, said, "We think that the 1981 National Hospital Week theme fittingly describes the commitment of our hospital staff to improving the future health of our community and the children we serve. We devote our fullest resources to providing the best health care possible today. But we know that we have to look to the future to find even better ways to care as patients' and the community's needs change."

Evidence of Kosair's commitment to caring for the area's handicapped children is the consolidation with Norton-Children's Hospitals. Studies have shown that a more centralized, comprehensive children's medical complex would better serve the health needs of youngsters.

Other areas in which Kosair looks to the future are through research - especially in the Scoliosis and Spine Treatment Center; new programs; fund raising; continuing education to keep staff members up to date with new techniques, treatments, equipment, and data; and improvements in braces and artificial limbs.

Recently a cost containment program was developed so that Kosair employees could help hospital administrators "look well into the future". Each month moneysaving suggestions from employees are analyzed and the originator of the most practical idea wins a day off. Last month Nurses' Aide Wilma Perkins' suggestion concerning bed linens led to a review of the use of all linens.

Health Care Trends

Predicting the future is not always possible, but planning for it is. Trends in the health care field in recent years provide indicators that help health care leaders and observers forecast hospitals' futures in the 1980's.

Did you know?

Each year in Kentucky about 1500 children under 6 years old are injured in car accidents and 15-20 are killed. If all pre-schoolers rode in safety seats, injuries would be reduced 80% and deaths 90%.

Nearly 5% of live-born infants have a significant congenital malformation, birth defect, or genetic disorder. During the last several years a variety of sophisticated technologies have been developed to diagnose fetal disorders and to manage high-risk pregnancies.

Violence - accidents, murder, or suicide — is implicated in three out of every four deaths in the 15-24 age range.

Between 1950 and 1977, the mortality rate for children aged one to 14 years halved.

- A baby born in this country today can be expected to live more than 73 years. A baby born in 1900 could be expected to live only 47 years.
- The number of hospitals operated as multi-hospital systems will double in 1989 to encompass more than 65% of the acute-care hospital beds in the U.S. Such networks of facilities and services have been increasing to centralize both management and the use of capital.

Marcia Humphrey

At a time when some other young mothers might start slowing down, Marcia Humphrey is gearing up. Now in her eighth month of pregnancy, she recently went from part-time to full-time in Medical Records.

She said, "When my present position opened and with the cost of living rising every day, it seemed like the perfect time to start working more."

Mrs. Humphrey started at Kosair nine years ago — first as a switchboard operator and then as the hospital's first admissions clerk. She also worked on the transcriptions desk, taking a few months off in 1979 for the birth of her twin boy and girl. After their arrival she returned part-time to Medical Records.

"I really like Medical Records," she said, "because of the variety of work — statistics, filing, charts, admission papers, fiscal reports. There's always something to do."

Some of the important things she transcribes are the histories and physicals, "op notes", or operative records on the patients who have had surgery, and discharge papers.

On the operating end of the "op notes" is Anna Johnston, R.N. As surgical supervisor she is in charge of the 15 people in surgery and the cast room. After 20 years in her field Mrs. Johnston said that she is addicted to her work. "I like being able to control the quality of care the patients receive in the Operating Room," she said.

Her work is important enough to her, in fact, that in 1979 she was one of the first nurses in the U.S. to receive her certificate for operating room nursing. She is also attending night classes at U of L and in December will receive her B.S. in health education.

She said that one of the highlights of her career was in 1970 when she was sent to Paris to learn about Kosair's Cotrel table for putting casts on scoliosis patients. She spent a week observing the French team and the famous Dr. Cotrel who designed the table. She asked questions through an interpreter and returned to Kosair to train what is believed to be the only Cotrel team in the U.S. Since the crinoline and the soft stockinette shirts that go under

the casts are unavailable in this country, she helped design a pattern for them so they can be made at the hospital.

"I'm proud of my involvement in that project," she said, "because the Cotrel technique provides a better correction than other techniques and the casts are less bulky."

Another participant in that experience was Beulah McKinney. She is Kosair's seamstress and helped Mrs. Johnston develop the pattern for the stockinette shirts. Now she makes them up "by the batch". As a part-time employee she also mends, makes drapes, and sews a variety of items that saves the hospital money.

Nineteen years ago when she first started at Kosair she was even responsible for making traction straps and for providing clothes for the patients. "Many of the children came in from the mountains," she said, "and they just didn't have anything to wear so church women helped me make clothes for them."


"I guess I'm just cut out to sew," said Mrs. McKinney. "Even at home, if I'm not sewing for myself, my daughter, or my 16-year-old granddaughter, I'm quilting. I just love it."

It takes many employees like Mrs. Humphrey, Mrs. Johnston, and Mrs. McKinney, who love their jobs and whose work in different areas of the hospital overlap in small but important ways, to care for the children of Kosair.

Blind Singer and Golfer to Play in Tournament

Of all the celebrities playing in the golf tournament, none could relate to the children of Kosair better than Tom Sullivan. Blind since birth, Sullivan has overcome what he calls his "inconvenience" to become a singer, composer, arranger, actor, and athlete.

He rowed in the 1967 Henley Regatta, won a place on the 1968 U.S. Olympic wrestling team, plays basketball, swims, rides horses and motorcycles, runs eight miles a day, has made 37 skydives and is a fanatic golfer who shoots in the low 90's. Sullivan's golf pro and constant companion, David Foran, helps him on the course by positioning him and describing the holes.

He had hoped to play in the 1980 Foster Brooks Tournament but was unable to break a previously scheduled singing engagement. He expressed particular disappointment at not being on hand to visit with the children at Kosair.

Blindness Not A Handicap

When asked by a reporter for **Golf Magazine** if he considers himself handicapped, he said, "No, I'm **merely inconvenienced**. We label too much as we travel through life. People refer to the blind as handicapped, but what about the person who is shy or fat or worried about growing old or troubled about being inept in some important area of living?

"Those handicaps can be more troublesome than blindness because people do not take such shortcomings into account, whereas they make all kinds of allowances for the blind. But classify a handicap as an inconvenience and it becomes only one tiny factor in the total person."

As a musician, Sullivan performs in nightclubs and on television; has arranged scores for Ray Charles, Aretha Franklin, and Lou Rawls; and dreams of becoming a top executive of a major record company.


At 33 he has written two books about his own life — Adventures in Darkness and If You Could See What I Hear, soon to be released as a movie. He lives with his wife and two children in Palos Verdes, California.

Dear Mr. President:

Attached is a copy of the response from Mr. Fred Fielding, Counsel to the President, that I received to my letter to you dated March 30, 1981. (Item No. 1). I suggest that you have a closer look at the abilities of your counsel, Mr. Fielding. The reasons are:

7 1.

I am a free born United States citizen. My birth right makes me a part owner of the United States government.

- 2. The Federal government, including the Office of the President, are servants to the citizens of the United States.
- 3. On March 30, 1981, I sent a certified letter to the Office of the President requesting of him some evidence (a sample of his stationery) that I need to use in a court of law of the United States. My letter makes an official citizen's legal request for use of public property that is in the care and trust of the President's office.
- 4. My letter to you, dated March 30, 1981, listed the options to the Office of the President of the United States. Please see the attached copy. (Item No. 2)
 - A. First Option: This was addressed to the man in the office. Quote: "Please mail me a letter, etc."

Statement: There are two acceptable methods to collect legal evidence under the United States Constitution. One is to simply ask for it as gentlemen do. The second method is to wait until I go to court and then take the evidence through the power of the subpoena. Out of the high respect for the Office of the Presidency, I elected to use the gentlemen's method.

20 May 1981

Allow me, the citizen, to offer you some counsel, since your official counsel is not looking out for the integrity of the Office of the Presidency of the United States. For an impartial letter you could just simply state the facts truthfully. (a) Yes, my official personal stationery is engraved, or (b) No, my official personal stationery is not engraved.

B. <u>Second Option</u>: This option is also impartial. Refer to Item No. 2 from the attached letter. Quote: "Supply me with a blank sheet and envelope of your personal engraved, official stationery." Note: The blank sheet and the envelope could be marked as follows: <u>This sample stationery is to be</u> <u>used for evidence purposes only</u>. Thus the impartial intent would not be misconstrued, nor would the official stationery be misused. We will be dealing only with facts. Note: <u>Truthful facts are impartial</u>.

<u>Statement</u>: Your counsel's answer (Item No. 1) does not address the above stated two issues. Your counsel is only putting out smoke in his effort to side step the issues <u>in your name</u>. This type of action and attitudes toward the taxpaying, voting, United States citizens, does not dignify the man in the office of the Presidency of the United States.

<u>Conclusion</u>: Now, let us put this plain and simple. Will you please supply me with the requested sheet of offical stationery and envelope, as requested in my previous letter to you? Or, is the Office of the President going to go on record for it's intention to suppress my request for stationery to be used as evidence?


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Dear Mr. President:
